Howdy again pard, I guess it's about time to talk about what kind of bullets to feed that big single shot of yours. One thing I have always wondered about is why the makers of long range cowboy bullets make them so hard. Super hard bullets can cause leading in the barrel. Sometimes they are so hard they don't "bump up" [obdurate] and expand into the rifling. This allows hot gas to blow by the bullet stripping off hot lead and depositing it in the barrel. How will you know if your barrel is leading up? Easy. You get little lead flakes or little lead "strips" on your cleaning patches. LEADING DESTROYS ACCURACY!

If you have cleaned your rifle and you keep getting little grey stripes on your cleaning patches, that can be an indicator that you still have lead in the bore. If you look down a clean, dry barrel, you can very often SEE the lead deposits. The most common place that it occurs is in the "throat" of the rifle...that is, the first 2 or 3 inches ahead of the chamber. It's got to come out! Using a brass brush only polishes the lead. You must use a good bore solvent and TIGHT cleaning patches to get ALL traces of lead out. How do you prevent leading? Go to a softer alloy. If you continue to lead up, you may have a "rough" bore. The only solution to that is to fire lap the bore. Kits are available that will smooth up the bore quite nicely if you follow instructions.

The bullet diameter should match the bore diameter. Shooting a too hard, undersized bullet too slowly will allow hot gas to blow by the bullet and deposit lead in the barrel. The HARDEST that your L.R. bullets should be is 20:1 [lead to tin] and the softest is 30:1. Both alloys are easily scratched with your fingernail. Try doing that on your cowboy bullets. The 405 grain cowboy bullets that I see look like great hunting bullets with that big flat nose but they are about as streamlined as a brick and are OK to use out to about 200 yards or so. Unfortunately, accuracy and velocity usually fall off past that. Why you may ask? The answer lies in a neat thing called "ballistic coefficient" [B.C.] Simply put, it represents a bullet's ability to overcome air resistance.

The more streamlined it is and the longer it is [for it's caliber] the higher the ballistic coefficient. Bullets with a high B.C. are less susceptible to wind drift [deflection]. Wind drift can blow you completely off target, and unfortunately, you don't get points for missing!

It is a long known fact that BIG bullets of the Creedmoor, Postell or Government style do much better at long range. .38 cal. 300-330 grain40 cal. 360-400 grain... and .45 cal. 480-540 grain bullets are what you need to really reach out and touch something [accurately]. The big bullets should have at least 3 or more grease grooves to keep fouling soft. Also, big bullets must be STABLE to be accurate. The rifle barrel must have a fast enough twist to match the bullet weight, and the bullet must have enough velocity. By twist, I mean that the bullet should make one complete revolution in so many inches, usually this is expressed as 1:18...1:16 etc. 45 caliber rifles should have a twist rate of 18, 40 caliber rifles should have about a 16 twist, and .38's should have a 15 twist.

How will you know if the bullet isn't stabile? Simple. You will see OVAL BULLET HOLES in your paper targets. That means that the bullet is "wobbling" and it only gets worse the farther it has to travel, and that mi amigo is death on accuracy. YOUR BULLET HOLES SHOULD BE PERFECTLY ROUND all the way to 1000 yards. The first and easiest way to try to correct bullet wobbling is to increase velocity. Check your loading manual to see how much more powder you can add and still be in safe limits. Your velocity should be in the 1200-1300 feet per second range. Wobbling bullets can also be caused by a bad crown on your rifle, shooting a big bullet too slow, "shaving lead" off the bullet base when seating in the case, seating the bullet tipped in the case, or a deformed bullet base.

If you don't cast your own bullets yet, Buffaloarms.com has a good selection of long range bullets to choose from. **Continued on next page.**

Order two or three different styles of bullet to see which one your rifle likes best. Unfortunately, shipping lead through the mail is expensive so go in with your buddies and order up enough bullets for the season. Sooner or later, if you get serious about long range shooting, you'll end up casting your own bullets. Hopefully you will have found a bullet style that your rifle likes so you all you have to do is order up that mould and start casting. I will get into casting in a future issue.

One thing you will quickly notice when you start using big bullets is that the recoil has increased. YOU CANT GET AWAY FROM IT but you can tame it a little. You have the option of using a wearable recoil pad such as the "Past" brand. Make sure that you buy the bigger one that is made for shooting in the prone position.[It comes up over your collar bone] Many experienced shooters have switched to the type of pad that can be slipped on the rifle butt. One that has become very popular is the "shooters friend" available from Cabelas or Buffalo Arms. Once you get the pad of your choice, the only advice I can give you about recoil is to LEARN TO IGNORE IT!

Believe me, I know that it's easy to say and hard to do but you really have NO CHOICE if you want to improve your shooting skills. Focus on your BREATH HOLD, SIGHT PICTURE and TRIGGER SQUEEZE and don't even think about the recoil. If you practice enough and focus on these three things, it won't be long before it doesn't bother you AT ALL. If you start to anticipate the coming recoil, MR. FLINCH will start to rear his ugly head. Flinching is probably the quickest and easiest bad habit to acquire and absolutely the hardest to get rid of. Remember, if you have a flinch, it doesn't just happen at a match, it'll happen in your deer blind too. We don't want that to happen there now do we?

One final thing before I hit the trail. I know that a lynch mob will be at my door for saying this but here goes. Cowboy shooters turn into trigger YANKERS not trigger SQUEEZERS. It's just the

nature of the game when you shoot against the clock. If you think that just because you have a set trigger on your rifle you don't have to squeeze the trigger YOU ARE VERY SADLY MISTAKEN! If you have a regular single trigger on your rifle, the movement resulting from a bad trigger pull is exaggerated even more. Most people are under the mistaken impression that if they pull the trigger when the sights are in the center of the target, that is where the bullet is going to go. If that were true we would all be shooting X's right? Remember, the farther away your target is, the more the "little mistakes" you make on the firing line are amplified. Unlike in cowboy or silhouette matches where a hit ANYWHERE on the target counts, in Mid and Long range matches and in the deer woods, it's WHERE you hit the target that will put you in the winners circle or bring home the venison. That's why I keep stressing the little things. Hope you learned something.


