Rocky River Regulators of DSC (Utica)

The town of Rocky River is finally starting to show some life as the snow starts to melt and we are able to see our boardwalks. Now we are working very hard to drain the enormous amount of water that is left by the snow melt.

Our first monthly Cowboy Action match was scheduled on Sunday, March 16, 2014. The overall winner of that match was a new cowboy shooter named Mother Nature. Mother Nature overpowered our range and we were forced to cancel our first match of the season.

Depending on when this article is published, we may have held our first Wild Bunch match of the season. April 6, 2014 is our first Wild Bunch match. We will shoot 4 or 5 Wild Bunch stages (depending on range conditions) followed by a light lunch and we invite all to come out and try this shooting sport.

We do have the SASS sanctioned Wild Bunch classes, but if you don't have all the Wild Bunch gear, no problem. We have an open class where you can shoot any caliber CAS lever action rifle and any CAS shotgun you may own. All you need is ANY semi automatic pistol that shoots LEAD bullets and you are ready for a Wild Bunch experience. A typical wild bunch stage could be 20 pistol, 10 rifle, and 6 shotgun. So if you want plenty of shooting and action, this might just be "your cup of tea". On April 13, 2014 we are holding a Bolt Action Military Rifle match. This is a different type of match than Cowboy Action, but growing in popularity with many shooters.

On April 26, 2014 at noon, we are hosting a Silhouette match on our 50 yard range. We shoot everything from .22 rifles to our Cowboy lever action rifles. Come and join us, we will have a class for almost any firearm that you bring.

On April 27, 2014, one week later than normal because of Easter Sunday, we will have our first monthly Cowboy match of the season. Registration starts at 8:30 am followed by the safety meeting at 9:30 am and then 5 fast and furious stages.

I managed to shoot one of the two clays. That was a lot of fun and quite a challenge.

Survey Question:

What ideas might you have to help recruit new shooters to the sport of Cowboy Action Shooting?

- Several people suggested variations of the following: Set up booths/vendor tables and/or have brochures at: gun stores, outdoor stores (Cabela's, Dick's, Bass Pro, Jay's, Gander Mtn, etc.), heritage events/festivals, expos (RV/ camper, fishing, hunting, gun/knife, etc.), western stores.
- Media. Match Directors should be putting press releases out. We had a writer for M-live do a story about the Rockford Regulators last summer. After it ran there was an increase in visitors at our matches. In the last year we at RSC have gained a couple of new shooters. If you gain a couple a year and don't lose any you are doing quite well.
- Open house at gun clubs with advertising for people to come out and try it! Have a couple of stages set up. Make sure you have enough cowboy shooters show up in costume to explain the sport. Also, have them all bring their guns and plenty of ammo so people may try it!
- ... Have demo days at the various clubs. Have a demo stage at Range War for spectators/visitors to "try it". This could possibly be done on Friday, and/or after the stages have been completed on Saturday.
- Our group Lapeer County Sportsmen's Club Wranglers has been contacted by a group from Oxford, MI. They have a parade each year, The Lone Ranger Parade. We will be participating and have passed the information along to R.J. Law. Hopefully we can get more Cowboy Shooters involved. We could do this in other communities around the area, do a float of some kind with banners and such.
- ...Participate in city, town or village: parades, special weekend events and give show and tell weekends at clubs etc. Also at events we should remember how we present ourselves is how people see us, appearance, how we talk and act, we are on display all the time, every day. One more item GUN SHOWS, get a table show pictures, movies and hand out literature. Remember if you want to attract people to cowboy shooting you have to convince the Wolverine Ranger membership that we all have to work together to ensure that this great sport will grow for us and for future generations...
- Ask gun/sportsman's clubs or other outdoor-enthusiast groups (Boy/Girl Scouts?) that do NOT already host Cowboy Action Shooting matches if they would like to host a group of volunteer instructors (experienced Cowboy shooters, dressed in their finest) and have an "open house" type event, where members of their club and their surrounding community are welcome to come and see what Cowboy Action Shooting is all about and how wonderful and friendly our members are. Get the guns into the hands of those who might not even know about our sport, or those that are on the fence about giving it a try. Get 'em hooked! Who knows, maybe doing something like this might even get a couple more clubs hosting regular Cowboy matches!
- Invite friends, coworkers, acquaintances who might be interested to watch a match or come to a practice. Be sure to put a gun in their hand when they attend. Try to get some sort of write-up in newspapers where there is a club nearby. Also, a write up in club newsletters, etc.
