

The Shooter's Stance

Posse Peeves

I am not one to complain, but these things ruffle my feathers just a bit. When you go to a monthly shoot, you get assigned to a posse. Posse size will depend on how many shooters signed up for the match. A posse shouldn't be too huge or one too small. What is the optimum posses size? I really don't know, perhaps 15 or so.

I shot on a posse once that had 28 shooters. That posse's size was way too large. By the time the last few shooters shot, most of the posse (about 90%) had packed up and went to strap on the feed bags. I didn't finish that stage until 3pm.

Okay let's say 26 shooters signed up, two posses of 13, not too bad. With each posse you will need a timer, 3 spotters, unloading table, loading table, and someone to pick brass and reset targets. That is 7 people that are needed for each shooter. That number can be reduced

some as shooters can watch each other load, and spotters can reset targets and pick brass.

If you are assigned a small posse EVERYONE has to help. Unless you are shooting, loading/unloading or in line to shoot, you should be helping your posse, not sitting on your gun cart watching. You could assist with brass pick up, target resets or relieve someone of their posse duties.

Some shooters, because of age or physical problems, usually sit on their gun carts and spot or work the loading/unloading tables.

Posses no matter what size, always need everyone to help.

Visiting River Bend Rangers—Niles

Saturday, June 10 promised to be a hot, sunny and dry day. The day lived up to its promises with temperatures in the mid to upper 80s. Very early that morning, Andy Horshurodinon and I met up to take a day trip to the Bend of River Conservation Club in Niles, MI and shoot a match with the River Bend Rangers.

But first a little background information. In the January printed edition of the Cowboy Chronicle I noticed that there was a CAS club in Niles, MI. I had never noticed it before and I knew that the club wasn't affiliated with the Wolverine Rangers. I contacted R. J. Law via e-mail about this and he said he had seen that there was a club there too. He contacted Paul Puma - the club's cowboy representative - and introduced himself and the Wolverine Rangers. Paul expressed an interest in joining the Rangers and in having the club become affiliated with the Wolverine Rangers group.

At that point I decided that I would make the trek to Niles at some point early in the shooting season to introduce the members there to myself and to the Wolverine Rangers as a group. I contacted Andy to see if he would be interested in joining me when I visited.



Andy and I found that we had overestimated the travel time by quite a bit. We met in Durand, MI which is fairly convenient to



both his home and mine. We met up at 5:00 am to make the trip to Niles and have some time for a good breakfast prior to going to the range to register and attend their safety meeting.

The safety meeting was to take place at 10:00 am. We got to Niles at about 7:45 so we had lots of time to kill before we needed to be at that range. We took our time and had a leisurely breakfast. We got a few stares from other patrons of the restaurant as we were dressed in our cowboy duds.

We arrived at the range about 9:15 and were greeted there by Paul Puma who was in the process of completing some last minute setting up of the stages. As the time for the safety meeting grew closer more competitors arrived.

When we started the match there were 10 of us who were competing. There were also a couple folks who came to watch and they stayed for the entire match and were, of course, given the opportunity to shoot a bit.

Paul had told me in an e-mail that they typically shoot 5 stages with most of them being 10 pistol, 10 rifle and 4+ shotgun. That sounded pretty familiar. This particular match however offered something different. There were six stages, one of which was an all shotgun stage and at least one (and I think it was 2) of the other stages had 6+ shotgun. I was glad I had brought a lot of shotgun shells with me. There was also one stage with an 11th rifle round with that extra round being loaded on the clock.

As I said, it was a small group and one of the competitors was shooting “wild bunch” instead of cowboy. Apparently this is the norm as they really don’t have many people to draw from and usually shoot a combined cowboy and wild bunch match.

Andy and I were a little taken aback as we found the targets there to be smaller than the ones we are used to shooting and they seemed to be a little farther away from the shooting line than we are used to. The combination of those two things made for a challenging day. In fact, I had more misses at that match than I have had in a long time. Looking at the results, I am shocked to say that I had a total of 16 misses for the day. Not my best showing.

On the other hand, I had the fastest time of all those competing on the all shotgun stage. All the shotgun targets that were used were of the “golden BB” variety.

All the stages we shot that day were of the stand and deliver variety. We did have one stage that was very different for me and from what I understand is a throwback from earlier days of cowboy shooting. We had to sit on a horse (a barrel with a saddle on it) and shoot our revolvers and rifle from atop the horse. No shotgun on that stage.

All in all, it was a fun day and Andy and I were pretty much exhausted by the time we got home.

I would suggest that any of the Wolverine Ranger members would have a good time there and should make plans to visit at least once this year. The club shoots on the second Saturday of the month with safety meeting at 10:00. It should be noted that lunch is not included with the entry fee but there are several nice places to eat not too far from the range.

Just before we left the Bend of River Conservation Club I was informed by Paul Puma that he had received Board of Directors approval for the club to become Wolverine Rangers affiliated and that he just had a bit of paper work to complete to make it official.
