BLACKPOWDER 12 GA. SHOTSHELL RELOADING PART 1 BY MACKINAW KID

Everyone has an opinion on loading blackpowder cartridge or shotgun shells. I will be writing this article based on my research and experimentation in loading for the old scatterguns. You have to remember that many of these earlier guns were designed purely for blackpowder and even have the old chambering. 12 ga. came in many lengths from 2 3/8" to 2 5/8". The 2 ¾ " didn't come about until 1893, when smokeless powder was introduced for shotshells in the US. Enough about history, let's get into the meat of this article....Loading.

First off you have to determine what length chamber your shotgun is. Many of you sidewinders are using modern made shot throwers so you don't have to worry about whether it is a short chamber or the more modern 2 3/4". If you have one of the older guns and you are not sure take it to a competent gunsmith and have him check old Betsy out. Make sure it is shootable and measure the chamber. It is easy to take plastic shells and cut them down or even paper. Federal still makes their paper champions in 12 ga. Don't forget many of these old guns are not designed to take the pressures of modern smokeless powder and I cannot recommend anything but blackpowder or one of its substitutes.

In this first installment, we are going to discuss using brass 2 5/8" shotgun shells. I have been using many different brand names... CBC made in Brazil, UMC, Remington, Alcan, Redhead and Winchester. Some are new manufacture and some are from the 1800's. I prefer to use new old manufactured shells. These shells use large pistol primers. Alcan's can be altered by taking a "C" size reamer, a drill press and opening the primer pocket to fit a modern 209 primer. CBC shells use Berdan primer that are expensive and hard to find. Old West Scrounger sells both shells and primers. You need to check with them on pricing and availability. I have heard many people say that you need magnum primers for blackpowder. This is not true. It is true for Pyrodex and some of the blackpowder substitutes. But blackpowder ignites with a wisp of warm air and really needs no extra help.

Tools! It is <u>not</u> recommended to use a powder measure and drop like a Lyman, RCBS, or any of the modern powder measures. It is better to use the dip and pour method. Dip the powder out of a container, preferably metal because plastic can cause static electricity, which may cause the powder to ignite, using a measure of a predeter-

mined charge and pour it into a casing.

Remember we are trying to do Dram equivalents. One dram equals 27.3 grains of 2F blackpowder measured on a scale, which is equal to 30.6 grains in a volume measurement. Most of the loads that I use are 3 drams, which is equal to 92 grains volume measurement or 82 grains measured on a scale. What this all breaks down to is you will need a powder measure like the muzzleloaders use or one of the old measures that do both drams and shot in ounces. Most of the time you can find these measures at gun shows and I have even found them at yard sales. Look around, I'm sure you Granddad used one and maybe it is just lying around somewhere just collecting dust. I use two, one for shot and one for powder. These can be used with blackpowder substitutes as well. You are going to need some kind of tool to seat your wads. I searched high and low and found straight line wad setters at gun shows. Some are brass tubes some are nickel plated but basically all it is is a tube with a funnel on one end that will fit over a 12 ga. shotgun shell, with a wooden dowel to push the wads down inside. I have seen it done with just a wooden dowel and a cardboard tube that will fit over the outside of the shell snuggly.

I started looking for just the tools I needed for loading brass shotgun shells and it has ended up becoming a whole new hobby (obsession). I have what started from 5 or 6 tools to a 4' x 5' cabinet that now houses my collection. Just when I think I have enough I find one more piece that I just can't live without. Okay lets get on with loading

this shotgun shell.

First we start with a primer. I am going to use a UMC brass 12 ga. 2 5/8" shotgun shell that takes a standard large pistol primer. I don't use rifle primers because some of the old guns have tired springs in them. A Winchester or Federal primer works just fine. Some of the old casing you will find with an old copper domed primer. In many cases these are contaminated and will not work, but just for safety sake put it in your shotgun and fires the primer before you try to remove it from the shell. Inspect the casing for any cracks or heavy corrosion before you reload. Once you have deprimed the shell, clean the primer pocket, prime with a new boxer primer. Now you are ready to put new components in the shotshell. Measure out 3 drams or 92 grains of 2F blackpowder and pour into shotshell. Next you will need a wax cookie. This is made from bee's wax. Use can use what beekeepers call foundation. This will go over the powder and protect it from our next wad, which is called a grease cookie. This can be made from felt. I have been using old wool army blankets. (Make sure there are no synthetics woven into the blanket.) I get my wife to wash it for me in hot water and dry it on high heat in the dryer. This shrinks the wool to the maximum. For grease I use either Wonder Lube or a secret formula that I have found though talking to people and trial and error have come up with, 50% petroleum jelly and 50% bees wax. You can add Wonder Lube, Crisco it doesn't matter. What does matter is that you need this lubricant to keep the fowling soft. It also helps keep the barrel from leading up as badly. CONTINUED-Take your wads after you have cut them or if you don't have

BLACKPOWDER SHOTSHELL CONTINUED

...cutter you can use Ox-Yoke wads and place them in a plastic container with enough lubricant to saturate the wads and place them in the microwave. Nuke them long enough to melt all the lube into the wads. You want them so that they feel wet to the touch. Place one of these wads over the grease cookie. Now we are ready for the over powder card. The over powder card is a 1/8" thick hard cardboard wad. Place this on top of the grease cookie. So far we have powder, wax cookie, grease cookie and over powder card. This protects our next wad, a cushion wad. The cushion wad is placed on top of the over powder card and helps to keep the shot from deforming when the powder gases expand. Once we have built this column you are ready for the shot. I've been using 1 1/8 oz. of No. 6 shot. I found that the heavier shot sizes work better with blackpowder. The 1 to 1 1/8 oz. loads have been working well at taking down poppers and moving swingers. Now we need something to keep the shot from falling out. With the 2 5/8" brass shell I've had to make up about 1/2" before I could insert the overshot card. I've used a cushion wad for filler. Then the overshot card. At this point you need something to hold the card in. I am lucky I was able to find a crimping tool, which rounds the edge of the brass holding in the card. You also can use...Elmers school glue, fingernail polish, water base enamel paint. I prefer the Elmers glue but make sure there is no grease around the mouth of the case or the glue will not stick to it. You could use the polish, just think of all the funky colors out there. You would have the ability to color code each of your shot loads. (Red looks good with brass.) There are many tools you can find for crimping 12 ga. brass shells. The Old West Scrounger has crimping and full length sizing dies that fit into the RCBS Rockchucker. Remove the 7/8 nut and the threads are 1 ½, which fit the sizing and crimping dies. Don't forget to ask for a shell holder if you order these.

Next issue we will discuss plastic and paper hulls as well as modern plastic shot cups. We will also give you a list of suppliers for wads and other components.

Scheduled for the afternoon were Long Range Rifle and Speed Pistol matches.
