Shootout at Hard Times SASS Ohio State Championship (June 2003)

As I worked my way down the street I could hear the music coming from Chihuahua's Cantina. Just before I got to the door someone pushed a set of maracas at me and said "dance" while pointing a .45 at me. Not being a total fool, I whooped it up with the maracas all the way to my rifle! Turning, I told them they were right, "boys, it's time to dance".

Wait a minute, I'm getting ahead of myself. I thought I was in the town of Hard Times. In reality I was at the SASS Ohio State Championship, "Shootout at Hard Times" hosted by the Miami Valley Cowboys in Piqua, Ohio.

The shoot consisted of ten stages. The MV Cowboys had the shoot set up with two start times, 0830 and 1100 each day. Their stages were: #1 The Bank, #2 Boot Hill, #3 Chihuahua's Cantina, #4 The Stagecoach, #5 The Saddle Inn,

#6 Cattleman's Emporium, #7 Eldorado "Sunday School", #8 Fort Pickawillany, #9 Blacksmith Shop "Michigan Cowboys Steal a Horse "(I didn't steal their horse but I did blow a big hole in their fence), and #10 The Jail (what shoot would be complete without a jail break).

Thursday was side match day. You could shoot all the matches free once. If you wanted to you could pay \$15 and shoot the matches as many times as you wanted. With only about 140 registered shooters you needed a lot of ammo!

Friday was the first day of the main match. When the mandatory safety meeting was over a Color Guard presented our Flag for the National Anthem. When all the Yeeeeee Haaaawin' was done everyone headed for their first stage of the day. All the stages were setup well and in two days of shooting my posse didn't have any prop failures. Now, as for me, it was a jammed rifle, missed shotgun targets (you could make them up), hole in the fence, and almost ran out of shotgun shells. That was just one stage. We'll have more fun tomorrow.

Friday night the MV Cowboys put on a steak dinner for just \$10. That's right, big juicy T-bone steaks. Now we had to wait awhile but once we got ours they weren't bad at all. In fact, I'd say pretty darn good (a lot better than the chicken fried steak at Trailhead). The only bad weather came just as the last of the people were being served. The storm blew in and R. J. Law and The Lady were still waiting in line. You folks have got to run faster next time.

Saturday we started where we left off Friday but with an 1100 starting time on Stage #4 - The Stagecoach. Everything seemed to be running fine with everyone I talked to enjoying themselves. Because of Eleanor's Emporium being located down by the range and the food vendor right across the road we had a chance to talk to a lot of the shooters. We didn't hear a bad word from anybody.

When the shooting was done it was time to get all gussied up for the big party. Here's one for y'all.

When have you ever been to a shoot that had shuttle service to and from the banquet? Well, the Miami Valley Cowboys did. Free, courtesy of local businessman Paul Sherry. All you had to do was sign up. They would pick you up at the campground at the range or any of the local motels. I thought it was a great idea. At the banquet the food was good, the costume contest great, the music too loud (even for a deaf guy) and they gave away some real nice door prizes.

Sunday morning there was Cowboy Chapel, the Awards Ceremony, the Top Gun Shootout and a Team Event. Michigan was well represented at the Awards Ceremony. When: August 3rd

Why: For anyone who likes to shoot for recreation. This is not a serious sport, it's for havin' fun

How: We shoot single action pistols, double barrel or 1897 pump shotguns, and pistol caliber rifles
