Lapeer County Wranglers

The main things going on here at Lapeer concern our Winter League which we run during the months of December thru March. We do not have any scheduling problems or anything of that nature. We will be having our usual second Sunday of the month shoots for each of those above named months. The problem is in numbers of shooters. Never thought I would ever discourage anyone from attending any of our shoots, but we do have a problem that I think we have solved by putting our heads together and coming up with a plan.

We're looking at 30 shooters as being the ideal number for each of our monthly matches. We plan to divide the number of shooters into two posses and have one posse outside shooting while the other posse relaxes inside the pistol building until the first group is done with its stage. Then the posses would trade places. Group #1 relaxes inside while group #2 is outside shooting. We feel this will eliminate the problems we had last year with too many people outside at one time. Of course, this means no gun carts will be permitted in the pistol building. We also would like anyone who shoots to bring just their uncased long guns into the building. Long guns will be placed in gun racks we are constructing that will be on the outside wall by the pistol range. There will also be space for your ammo boxes just below the new gun racks.

The question has come up as to how do we know if we are within the group of 30 shooters or are possibly #'s 31, 32, etc.? As I said before, we think 30 is an ideal number of shooters but that does not mean we are going to tell #'s 31, 32, etc. to turn around and go home. One suggestion was made to let me know you plan to attend the shoot by calling or emailing me. Another possible solution would

be to create a third posse and simply rotate with one posse shooting and two being inside the pistol building. In any event, I'm sure we'll be able to handle the situation safely and keep everything moving so that we are through shooting by 2:00pm at the latest.

The Lapeer County Sportsmen's Club has also just held their annual "scramble for shooting dates" meeting and we have locked in our 2005 schedule.

The Kimberly Anne Gillary Foundation will present to Durand Area High School an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) on Friday, October 29, 2004 at 12:00 noon in the high school library. The donation is made possible through the generosity of the Michigan Cowboy Action Shooters. The money was raised at the Michigan Cowboy Action Shooting Championship sponsored by the Wolverine Rangers. The donation of the AED is in remembrance of Kimberly Anne Gillary who died as a result of cardiac arrest suffered during a water polo game at Birmingham Groves High School on April 1, 2000. The Foundation's purpose is to donate an AED and training to every high school in Michigan and to advocate cardiac screening and testing of all high school student athletes so that other students don't have to die from a sudden cardiac arrest.

Durand Area High School has a 25 year history of offering American Red Cross First Aid and CPR programs to their students and the community. We were one of the first schools in the state to have offered the programs as individual courses in our curriculum. Our offerings have ranged from Com-

munity First Aid and CPR to Emergency Response and CPR for the Professional Rescuer. We have offered students the opportunity to take State Approved Medical First Responder Classes. At this time we are an authorized provider for American Red Cross First Aid and CPR programs. We are also becoming a training satellite of Memorial Healthcare for American Heart First Aid and CPR programs. This past spring our coaches were trained in First Aid and CPR by Memorial Healthcare staff, Ken Roost, PA and Sonia Lepeak, RN. On June 3rd and 4th, 2004, with assistance once again from the staff of Memorial Healthcare, the staff at Durand Area High School was allowed to use their professional development time to be trained in American Heart Adult CPR and AED. Creating a safer environment for community, students, and staff is a number one priority at DHS.

Thank you, Baldy Bill, for doing an outstanding job of selecting a school that places the highest value on the safety of their students, staff and visitors.
