
take hundreds of photos during Range War and also to Avalanche Andy for taking the time during the banquet to take pictures of all of the winners.

Hospitality was amazing and this is our second time! Fantastic experience – thanks again to Deuce for fixing my Marlin – really appreciate the help! Best banquet ever!

I was not able to shoot this year but enjoyed the experience of being here and meeting old friends.

Real good match.

Please ask campers to turn off generators after midnight.

Food vendor did not bring enough food. Neutral on vendors – hard to find. Did not attend Saturday dinner – last year chicken was not done.

Would like to see belt buckles for awards instead of plaques. Possibly a photographer.

Enjoyed close targets. On great posse with great workers. Love brass rats at this shoot. Your theme this year & booklet stories were good!!

I know it's difficult to get them, but I wish there were more vendors.

Better job on Stage Scenarios...what happened to the vendors? Did someone forget to invite them? The posses need to be more even – we had to wait because 2-3 posses before us were running slower.

The shade tents were not set up. Would be helpful to have instructions attached to the frames so the posses could set them up.

Stages flowed well, good movement. A few targets were "dead" causing at least one miss called incorrectly. Random tables for eating – copy Guns of August's procedure for table order.

Not very much room on some of the stages for motorized carts and golf carts – can we leave them out on the main roads? Very crowded! <u>Great stages!!</u>

I gave the overall experience a 4, only because of some issues on the campground. Registration, Stage Scenarios and Banquet all received a 5, everything else was n/a, although I guess I could give the food vendor a negative rating after hearing they left you in a lurch for having food on the range on Friday after the side matches. Kudos to you and your crew/family for quick thinking on the pizza. I was in the clubhouse when you were discussing it, but didn't really realize exactly what had happened. I only shot one side match, and that was at the coaxing of Wildcat Maverick who loaned me his pocket pistol and provided ammo, but having been on the range and taking photos, I could see they were well run and efficient.

Range War 2016 Suggestions for Next Year:

More junior awards for side matches like Ohio does. More prizes.

Ice cream truck @1:00 pm daily

No standing long guns. No 1st time shooters at a State match.

More vendors!!! Make posses equal or closer.

No double posses – too much waiting. 12 on one & 24 on another.

Clean porta potties. Same target placement – fast & fun – great.

Same target placement

Would like buckles rather than plaques. If possible more vendors.

Maybe buckles next year?

Need to shoot 4 stages for Wild Bunch.

Even up posse sizes

Even up posse numbers. More vendors!!! Set up canopies ahead of time. Shorten banquet.

Do it again!

No change.

Keep on keepin RJ, Deuce & crew are fantastic.

Porta potties for men only.

Please ask campers to turn off generators after midnight.

Maybe cowboy church on Saturday evening?

Continue to have clinics. Absolutely LOVED the transitions clinic. I LOVED the one-on-one time with great shooters!! Thank you.

How about a swap meet (if we are not going to have vendors)? We have an FFL here (I'm sure).

Draw posses out of a hat (keeping couples/families together). That way they are even and non one person shoots with their own "entourage"... who knows – you might even make new friends.

The props were good – more of those would be great.

I ask this one last time – how about a reduced rate for family members (whether maxing out paying for 3 family members or changing the reduced rate from "spouse/significant other" to "second family member")? They say this is a family sport, but it's too pricey for a whole family to shoot. And I'm sure I'm not the only one who feels this way. I'm just the only one who's mentioned it.

Why not take the money that is "given away" at the FREE shoot and use it to build/ buy props for Range War?

Let's try to invite the vendors well in advance (say 6 months) before Range War. Maybe even vendors not totally associated with CAS (fabric vendors, old fashioned candy vendors, etc.)

Balance the size of the posses to prevent waiting for other groups to finish.

Would like to see a "Spirit of the Game" award or at least a mention for those posse members who go the extra mile.

Please *seriously* consider an area that is "generator free" on the campground, and/or a rule that quiet time is 10pm. Quiet time being described as generators off, no kids running around screaming, no loud music/conversations. This is standard operating procedure at most campgrounds, although times do vary. I think 10pm is very reasonable. Some of us have a very hard time getting any rest because of the noise (and fumes). Anyone in a tent or a pop-up camper (a tent on wheels) has very little to shield them from these elements. Even with getting to the campground very early and staking out a spot where you think you will have space and quiet doesn't usually work. Invariably, someone comes and parks themselves very close to your established camp. I am not sure if this is feasible or practical, but please consider the idea. I understand that many people come to party, but for those of us who are giving a little extra of themselves at Range War, it's very draining when you can't sleep well at night (or long enough) and can't even get a nap in the afternoon. This is my fourth year at Range War, and this year wasn't an isolated experience with generators and loud conversations/laughter.

Also a comment about the Boy Scouts: They were my primary issue at the campground this year. I arrived on Thursday afternoon and established my campsite well away from anyone else, in hopes that it would remain that way. On Friday, another camper arrived and parked a short distance away and was later followed by a whole "circle of wagons" later in the day. Much to my disappointment, it turned out to be the Boy Scouts. Friday night, they were running around screaming, apparently playing tag or hide and seek in the dark. I was in bed at a little after 10pm. I figured it would stop soon. When it was after 11pm and it still continued, I unzipped my window and hollered out to them to please keep it down because people were trying to sleep. I heard one adult say "stop screaming". This did not end their games. I gave up and laid in bed wide awake while they continued a while longer. Saturday afternoon, someone at their campsite set up an older, loud generator right between their campsite and mine. Considering that I got so little sleep on Friday night, I had planned to get a nap on Saturday afternoon. Being as warm as it was and not having air conditioning in my pop-up, windows needed to be unzipped in order to even be habitable. With the generator running essentially right outside my camper and the prevailing slight breeze blowing exhaust right at my camper, not to mention the noise. I couldn't even be IN the camper, let alone get a nap. The generator was running until after midnight when it finally ran out of gas or was shut down. I asked fellow shooters who are seasoned campers and were near me and could see the proximity of everything if that was proper campground etiquette and they agreed that it wasn't. To continue the saga, Saturday afternoon, the kids were playing with balls right outside my camper and very near my car. Since a nap was out of the question, I was visiting with someone at their campsite across from my camper and I am nearly positive I heard the ball hit the grill of my car. I then spoke up and told them to go play in the big open area of the field and not by my car. I will also add that an adult had joined in with their play and he should have known better! I also saw that they had dug holes around their campsite, for what purpose, I do not know, but I did mention it to Wildcat Rose so she could let Wildcat Maverick know. If it was a problem, I am sure he would be letting you know. To their credit, they did fill the holes back in when they broke camp Sunday afternoon.

Please don't get me wrong, I am glad they are there to help with brass retrieval and they are being involved, but their campground etiquette has a lot to be desired. There were several adults who were, I assume, supposed to be supervising these youngsters and steering them along the correct path of being courteous and appropriately behaved. They fell WAY short of what the job I believe they should have been doing.

Thank you for reading this. I hope that something can be considered to make Range War a pleasant, yet fun event for *everyone* in the future. I hope that you have contact with the person who was in charge of the Boy Scouts and can relay the information I have provided here so maybe next time they are with us, things can be better.

The Shooter's Stance

Stepping Away From a Comfort Zone: My First Range War Experience

I'm Jack Holladay, member of Rocky River Regulators of DSC in Utica,MI. I have been with the Cowboy Action Shooting Club nearly 4 years now, participating in almost all of the 10 or so Cowboy matches per year. I've made myself comfortable in matches, helping with setup, becoming familiar with match shooters and committee members, and the procedures of a match at my "home range"

Rocky River Regulators member J.J. Longley has, not so subtly over the past years, mentioned I should participate in a State Match. Easy for him to say; With more years of participation under his belt, and being an excellent shot, he plays this game very well. I was not yet comfortable or confident with the idea of shooting at a State Match. Well, with the purchase of a 5th Wheel Trailer last fall, and continued success at home matches, stars started to align themselves. I decided this year would be a good opportunity to attempt a State Match, fully immersing myself in the event. I had made up my mind, and told J.J. I would go. I have no regrets about that decision.

I arrived on the grounds Thursday afternoon with my trailer in tow. I was pleased to find an open layout for parking, so I lined up with a couple from Iowa that were attending their second State Match. Camping on the grounds provided the opportunity to meet other shooters, see setups, and familiarize myself with the lay of the land. I also had more time to review the stages and shooting scenarios that were provided online the week prior.



Friday morning kicked off a Mini Match, consisting of 3 posses working over 4 stages, some similar to what would be presented on Saturday. While scores were calculated, they were not combined with Saturday and Sunday results. This was a relaxed practice to familiarize ourselves with the procedures and stages. With the mini match wrapping up mid afternoon, I had enough time to clean my guns at my trailer, get cleaned up myself, and enjoy dinner at the camp, alongside fellow Regulators J.J. Longley, Coyote Claxton and Camptown.

Saturday morning's main match was under way. We started the morning with opening ceremonies and a humbling presentation for those Michigan Veterans killed in action. Then the competition was on. Event Marshalls guided 10 posses through 5 stages of the match. The Marshalls were experienced, knowledgeable, and pleasant to chat with. I was also able to walk around, taking some pictures and observing other shooters. It truly felt like a match at DSC, just a bit bigger, and with a lot more people. We wrapped up mid afternoon, again allowing time to get my guns cleaned up at my trailer. Dinner was hosted at the Clubhouse on the grounds. The Cowboy Campfire followed, which was quite enjoyable. Live music and singing provided entertainment for the evening.

Sunday morning kicked off the second half of the main match, with another 5 stages. Again, the Marshalls expert guidance made for a smooth match. The evening was brought to a close with a banquet at Alexander's in Marysville. While at the dinner, a fellow shooter asked if I had shot a clean match. I explained that I was concentrating so much on avoiding major catastrophes that I wasn't entirely sure my match was clean. As it turns out, not only did I shoot a clean match, I took Michigan State Champion for Frontier Cartridge.

Traveling home Monday morning, I had a State Match under my belt, and 3 new plaques to place on my shelf. Beyond the awards though, success in stepping outside of my comfort zone was possible due to the well choreographed event. Expertise made the event go off without a hitch, and comradery made it feel like home. I am happy to mark the 2017 Wolverine Rangers Range War on my calendar.
