## Rocky River Regulators of DSC (Utica)

August 18<sup>th</sup> was our regular Cowboy Action match on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of the month. All I can say is that it was HOT and MUGGY but 32 competitors showed up to compete as they hone their skills for the Wolverine Rangers Range War that is just around the corner. When Camptown posted the scores; Leadfoot Luke took top honors followed by J.J. Longley and Sinola Kid. Shooting clean matches were Leadfoot Luke, J.J. Longley, J.C. Wade, Hey Sugar, Poco Loco, and Foot Sore.



Our next Cowboy Action match is Sunday, September 16, 2018.

Saturday, September 7th is our next Wild Bunch match of the season. We will shoot 5 Wild Bunch stages so all are invited to come out and try this shooting sport. We do have the SASS sanctioned Wild Bunch classes recognized but if you don't have all the Wild Bunch gear, no problem. We have an open class where you can shoot any caliber CAS lever action rifle and any CAS shotgun you may own. All you need is ANY semi automatic pistol that shoots LEAD bullets and you are ready for a Wild Bunch experience. A typical wild bunch stage could be 21 pistol, 7 rifle, and 6 shotgun. So if you want plenty of shooting and action, this might just be "your cup of tea".

Want to try something different...Cowboy Action with modern firearms! The Rocky River Regulators are putting on a 4 stage 3-Gun match on Saturday, October 5<sup>th</sup> on our range. Firearms used in this match are a semi automatic pistol, AR style rifle, and a pump or semi auto shotgun. Yes there are multiple targets per stage. We had a very positive turn out at our first match so we are limiting the shoot to 36 competitors. If you are interested in shooting this event, please contact Camptown at jt@doudna.net to pre-register. You MUST be pre-registered to shoot this event. Pay when you show up. We DO NOT take any walk up competitors on the day of the match.

## Johnson Creek Regulators - Plymouth

## Editor's Corner

### What's the Call

Recently there was a lengthy discussion on the Facebook page titled What's The Call that has to do with SASS regulations and their interpretation. The particular discussion that I have in mind started as:

Shooter is in Classic Cowboy category. Finishes stage, upon returning his long guns to the cart removes hat and hangs it on the cart. Helps with posse duties and only puts hat on when going to the line. WTC?

There was actually a very lengthy discussion regarding this —-72 comments to be precise. Most of the comments were serious with a few of them being rather whimsical.

The definitive answer is actually contained in The Shooter's Handbook page 8. "**Hats must be worn for the entire match.**"

Now certainly this can be relaxed due to weather conditions for a local monthly match and possibly even for the major matches, but that decision should be left to the Match Director. I'm thinking it is probably not relaxed at matches such as End of Trail which takes place in late June in New Mexico.

Why am I bringing this up? At Range War this year I was on a posse with someone who was shooting Classic Cowboy. I noticed that this person had removed his hat, hung it on his gun cart and was sitting down away from the rest of the posse. Now the temperature on that day was rather cool, so the requirement wouldn't have been relaxed. I called this infraction to the attention of the posse marshal. He in turn discussed it with two of his assistants and they all agreed that because he had left the vicinity of the firing line it wasn't necessary for him to be wearing his hat. He offered to take this up with the Match Director and I just didn't feel that it was worth going to all that trouble. In retrospect, I should have taken him up on that offer so that the participant could be made aware of the infraction.

In past Range War competitions those people shooting in categories that have specific clothing and/or gun requirements have been taken aside prior to the match to make sure they met the requirements. This hasn't happened in the past couple years.

So, what is the point of this entire diatribe? The rules in our game are pretty specific. I was disheartened that apparently our posse marshal and his assistants either weren't aware of the rule or didn't care. By "bendng this rule" the message is being sent that some rules don't have to be followed. And in doing so, they are not helping the shooter to better understand our game. If this is done at the local level and the shooter goes to a major match and is called for the infraction...Well, I'll leave that thought to your discretion.

And what is the proper call? It is a procedural because the shooter is shooting out of category. One "P" adds 10 seconds onto the time. A second "P" gives a stage disqualification and a third "P": gives a match disqualification. (page 23 and 24 of the Shooter's Handbook).
