# ★ Captain's Corner ★

Howdy pards,

Here we are at the beginning of July. Matches are opening up! We haven't been able to shoot as many matches as we would like but the ones we have been to this year have been great. It has been a joy to see everyone. The comradery of our sport is what makes it so special. Even with the social distancing just seeing our cowboy family has been amazing.

In June I attended matches at Lapeer, Saginaw, Breckenridge and Sturgis. All of these matches were well run, used safety protocols and were set up for safe distancing. Some wore masks, others did not. I wore a mask when I was within 6 feet of anyone; at registration, running the timer, picking brass, at the load table until staging my guns and at unload table. Sanitizer and bottled water were provided throughout.



Lapeer was especially fun as it was our first match post shutdown. I was impressed by their thoughtfulness on how lunch was provided. They chose pre-packaged lunch food, lunchables (meat, cheese and cracker trays) and some Hormel protein packs (nuts, cheese, raisins, etc.) along with chips, cookies, and bottled water. Everyone distanced as needed and it was a lot of fun.

Saginaw followed closely to the SASS guidelines. They put in a second loading table at each stage and asked that only one person be at each table. This was a nice addition. Lunch was prepared safely and was cooked and brownbag packed for pickup. All condi-

ments were individually packaged, and everyone seemed to enjoy this. As usual the targets were Big and Close, and it was a race to finish at each stage. It was fun really letting the guns fly.



At Breckenridge we couldn't have asked for better weather. It was clear, sunny, and warm. Masks were worn by those that preferred to wear them. I noticed about 1/3 of the shooters had worn them at some time throughout the day. Stages were well written with some movement and nice mix of target size, distance and variety. No lunch was served but this was emailed, posted on the web and Facebook pages ahead of time to let everyone know. Bottled water was provided. Hand washing stations were available as well as sanitizer at multiple locations.



At Sturgis the day was very humid and warm, but the shade in the valley was very helpful. It was nice to see

those from the southwest of Michigan as well as many friends from Indiana that drove up for the day. The stages were fun, and we even had a nice shotgun only stage with downrange movement. Sanitizer was provided at each stage and distancing recommendations were followed. No lunch was provided, but bottled water and pre-packaged snacks were provided.



All in all, each shoot was a great time and I look forward to matches this month at more clubs.

If you haven't read it yet, SASS has published a bulletin that outlines their minimum recommended guidelines titled "Best Practices for Conducting Matches in a COVID-19 Environment". This bulletin is posted on our website and on the SASS Wire. Please read it. I continue to urge all of our clubs to adhere to these current SASS guidelines. I know that the upcoming 2020 Wolverine Rangers Range War will follow these guidelines and we will review changes and implement any updates as they are posted.

Please keep your fellow shooters in mind. If you feel sick, have been sick in the last 2-3 weeks, or been in contact with someone that has COVID-19, please do not attend the match.

I am looking forward to our annual Wolverine Rangers Free Membership Shoot this month at Sucker Creek Saddle & Gun Club in Breckenridge on July 18<sup>th</sup>. This shoot is our yearly membership meeting for the Wolverine Rangers. We will provide a membership report, budget and financial report, award the 2020 Clean Match Award winners, review the plans for Range War 2020 and have a prize drawing (must be present to win). Details on lunch will be posted soon. I hope to see many of you at this shoot. It will be a rain or shine event.

Finally, I would like to update you on the 2020 Range War. This shoot is on as scheduled. We are receiving applications via the website and mail almost every day now. I have been in contact with almost all of our nor-

mal contract vendors (Tent, Port-a-potties, EMS, Brass Rats, Badges and Awards, Anthem singer, etc.) We have all of these items booked and in process.

Carolina Belle started sending out confirmations for each application we have received. You should see a confirmation email within a week of her receiving your application from here on out. If you haven't received your confirmation email, please reach out to her. (speechpath96@comcast.net)

At this time, we don't know what restrictions we will have in place come Labor Day. We are preparing for the shoot with this in mind.

We will have bottled water near each stage entrance, and sanitizer available at each, tent, registration and anywhere else considered high traffic. We have booked more port-a-potties than normal, each one will have sanitizer inside and will be deep cleaned and sanitized Saturday and Sunday mornings. We are reviewing other options and plans as well.

The border is not currently open to/from Canada. It is expected to open July 21<sup>st</sup>. We are accepting applications from Canadian residents. We will be offering full refunds up to the date of the shoot for those coming from Canada if the border restrictions do not open or are closed at the time of the shoot. For more info about registrations for Canadian shooter please contact Carolina Belle.

I urge everyone to sign up sooner rather than later this year. It would sure help our planning process a lot. It will also help if we run into a scenario where we have to limit the total number of attendees, by our Governors decree... Having your application in sooner would help to secure your entry. While we don't expect to have a cut off number, it may not be up to us.

## Rocky River Regulators of DSC (Utica)

The first day of summer did not disappoint. It was hot, sunny, and humid but 13 competitors showed up and dusted off their cowboy skills at our first match of 2020. This match was dubbed "bare bones" and only open to DSC committee members and a few invited guests. This match was designed to test the DSC and SASS Covid-19 protocol while shooting a match. I am very pleased to say that everyone maintained a 6' distance, wore a mask to register and to RO/timer. It was different, but doable. Just one observation, 6' separation, even outdoors, takes considerable space. I am sure, future Cowboy Action matches at DSC will have a limit on competitors as long as 6' distancing is in effect. We may institute an email RSVP system to reserve a spot in any match on our range. More to come on that procedure, please check the Wolverine Rangers web site frequently for updated information.

The match definitely showed that none of us have been shooting much this year, but it was fun "to get back at it". There were no clean matches, even though the stage scenarios were easy to navigate and the targets very hittable. When the dust cleared J.J. Longley took top honors, followed by Rifle Rick and Bad Brass.

Starting in July, DSC-Utica will be open to the public and we will be following our published schedule assuming all is well in Michigan and we don't return to strict Governor EOs. DSC has a strict Covid- 19 policy that every range must adhere to be open. We at DSC will publish our procedure prior to the July Cowboy match on the Wolverine Rangers web site. John McIntire, known to many of us as Chris Hale on Wagon train and Clay Grainger on The Virginian was born on June 27 1907. Although the Johnson Creek Regulator's missed celebrating McIntire's birthday 113 years later, we did celebrate finally being able to hold our first match of the year.

Although the match was limited to Western Wayne County Conservation Association members, we did have sixteen Cowboys and Cowgirls in attendance. Special precautions were taken. These precautions included social distancing, self sign-in, minimizing TOs, adding a second loading table, eliminating spotter sticks, hand sanitizer, eliminating lunch and wearing of face masks inside the range building (masks were not required outside).



The match was also advertised as a mail in match. Although several individuals expressed interest in the concept, no scores were received.

With his first overall match win with a solid time of 175.25, Slow Gin Ricky celebrated his first match win. Sarge was runner up, about 3 seconds behind. Iron Jennie was top lady shooter finishing third. Other notables in-

cluded Three Deuce Tom as the top Silver Senior, Wolverine Regulator top 49er, Rainmaker Ray top B-Western, Carson City Slick top Elder Statesman and J Bird Regulator was top Buckaroo. Iron Jennie and Deadeye Deska both had clean matches.
